## **Parking Lot Guidelines**

As a reminder, parking in the handicapped lot at the Center is restricted to vehicles with a handicapped license plate or placard. Parking is prohibited in the angled striped areas next to the handicapped spaces. In addition, members may not park in the paved spot directly in front of the activity room door. This is for pedestrian access to the building – not parking. The Park District green house is used year-round. Please don't block access to it. Traffic cones have been placed in that location. If you have any questions, don't hesitate to contact the Center.

#### In Person Tax Preparation Continues

AARP income tax preparers are at the Center on Tuesday and Thursday each week; don't delay in making an appointment. Your 2022 Federal and IL tax returns will be completed and electronically filed. Appointments are scheduled by calling the Center office. Most tax forms including 1040EZ, 1040A, and 1040 with schedules can be completed. A photo ID (driver's license, State ID, passport), social security card or Individual Taxpayer Identification notice, copies of tax returns from the last two years (2020 and 2021), all income documents like W-2's and 1099's, brokerage statements, and any other tax information specific to your situation must be presented at your appointment. A list of essential documents is available in the Center office. There is no charge for this service. However, appointments are required. Call the Center at 630/232-3602 to make an appointment.
